# All in a day's work



We couldn't celebrate the humans giving it their all for our dogs without mentioning our canine carers. These passionate dog lovers go many extra miles every single day for the dogs in our care. Not only providing our pooches with all the food, blankets, and safety they need, but also giving them the love and playtime they deserve while we find them a new home.

We caught up with Rachel Wadsworth, one of the canine carers based at our Leeds centre, to find out what it's like to work for the benefit of dogkind.

Rachel says, "I've been passionate about animals since childhood and have always wanted to make the world better for them. Last year, I adopted my Beagle cross, Daisy, from Dogs Trust Ilfracombe and had such an amazing experience. I loved the staff, the centre facilities, and the aftercare we were provided with. I remember saying to my husband 'I'm going to work here one day', and now, here I am!"



A day at one of our rehoming centres can be as varied as our dogs. But some essentials need to happen to keep things running smoothly.

Rachel says: "Every morning the team gets together for a briefing - we discuss any appointments for the dogs and any other important information. We also plan who's caring for which dogs for the day, so all dogs are looked after. Then it's down to the kennel blocks.

We decide who's doing what and then get to work. First, we put their food together, sort out any medications and take the dogs out so they can go to the toilet. This bit usually goes smoothly because we all work together really well - I'm lucky to have such a great team."

"Next, we clean their kennels to keep them all safe, clean and happy. We make sure they have fresh water, bedding and plenty of toys. The corridors are swept and mopped, windows opened, and cleaning equipment disinfected.

After cleaning, we usually head to the staffroom for a quick coffee and bite to eat - it's physical work, so we need to keep our energy levels up!"



"After a quick break, it's time to take the dogs out. Their sessions can consist of walks, agility, scentwork, an offsite walk, training, playing with toys etc. - anything that will enrich their lives.

I have three project dogs at the moment, which means I'm responsible for carrying out the behaviour management plans they've been given by our training and behaviour advisors. These dogs have specific training in place to help them be rehomed quicker, so it's very important to keep on top of their plans.

At the end of the day, everyone gathers for the shutdown. Shutdown involves preparing more food and medications, cleaning the kennels again, replenishing toys, taking the dogs out for their last toilet breaks of the day, refreshing water bowls and emptying the bins before we turn off the lights and let the dogs settle down for the night."

When asked what her favourite part of the day was, Rachel said, "That's a tricky one. I've wanted to work for Dogs Trust forever, and now that I'm doing it, I sometimes have to pinch myself!"

I just love making the dogs happy. Giving them quality time outside of their kennels is so important to me, I genuinely put everything I have into every single one. Bonding with the dogs after putting in the effort is magical.

As I said earlier, I also love the people I work with. We're always singing, making each other laugh, and supporting each other, which is so important in a job that can be very emotionally challenging at times.

But I think the ultimate part of my working day is seeing a dog go home with their new family. We sometimes shed some tears when they leave us, but they're (mostly) happy tears. Knowing that I played a part in getting them ready for their new home is the icing on the cake for me, and makes it all worth it."

Finally, we asked Rachel what she would say to anyone thinking of adopting one of our dogs, and she had this advice: "If you have patience, are willing to put in the work and give a dog the time they need, then go for it! There's no love like the love you get from a dog when you've won their trust. And providing them with the space to grow into themselves is such a gift."

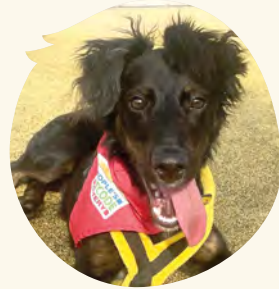
## Thanks to Pets at Home Pets Club members for so many treats and toys!

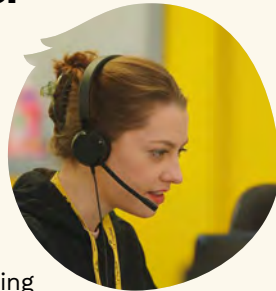
Thanks to the support of players of People's Postcode Lottery, in the last 10 years we have:

Get crafty for canines with this doggy double-header. No need for a trip to the supermarket, here's how to create some mutt magic with bits you probably already have around the house.

## Make your own bog-roll barker

Transform your bog roll into dog roll with this loo-nique activity (sorry). Whether it's your beloved pet or a furball you've been admiring from afar, craft your very own canine from the comfort of your home.

### You'll need:

- a toilet roll tube
- paint brush and paint (we used water colour)
- cardboard (cereal boxes work well)
- googly eyes (optional)
- marker pen
- glue (we used a glue stick)
- scissors



### What to do:

1. cut out your crafty canine's tail, paws, nose, and ears from your cardboard
2. paint their body (the tube), paws, and tail in one colour, and the ears and nose in another.
3. once dried, glue on your dog's eyes, nose and ears
4. use the pen to draw a mouth on your dog and to add pads to their paws
5. glue on your pup's paws and tail
6. the best part... sit back and admire your new best pal.

## Toilet-roll rescue treat pouch

This one's for the problem-solving pooches to enjoy. Any old pup can swoop a handheld treat into the safety of their belly. But can your dog rescue one from this toilet roll trap? Our snuffle pouch is an excellent source of enrichment for your hound, and it won't cost a thing.



### You'll need:

- a toilet roll tube
- paper or light cardboard (optional)
- your dog's favourite treat

### How to make it:

1. position a couple of your dog's favourite small treats inside the tube with some scrunched up pieces of paper
2. flatten your tube, tightly folding over the ends
3. place it on the floor and let the rescue begin.



# Lurchers and Greyhounds



If you're thinking about a new furry family member, a Lurcher or Greyhound could be the pooch for you. We rehome hundreds of these lovable long boys and girls every year, and with their graceful looks and gentle nature, it's no wonder they're among the most popular breeds adopted from us.

Not sure about a long dog? Here are some common misconceptions that could be holding you back from your new best friend.



## Misconception: they need lots of space

Yes, Lurchers and Greyhounds are on the larger side, but that doesn't mean they need a mansion. Like all dogs, they just need space to sleep, eat, play and relax. You may need to keep an eye on the taller of these pooches, if their noses reach the table. But there are benefits too, like not having to bend over so much to clip their lead on.



## Misconception: muzzles mean trouble

Dogs wear muzzles for all kinds of reasons. Some Lurchers and Greyhounds may have a high prey drive so need to wear a muzzle when out and about. These dogs can be friendly, confident, and love meeting new people and other dogs, although as with any dog, it's always best to ask the owner before approaching. ## Misconception: they need loads of exercise

Despite their athletic build, Lurchers and Greyhounds don't require endless exercise. Some enjoy a good run, but many will be happy with a leisurely stroll. They're sensitive to extreme temperatures due to their thin coats, so might need a little extra care in hot or cold weather.

After their exercise needs have been met, most will be quite content snuggled up on the sofa or sprawled out on a comfy bed—they're masters of relaxation.

## The truth about Lurchers and Greyhounds

Just like any dog, Lurchers and Greyhounds are individuals with their own personalities, likes, and dislikes. They can all make incredibly loving companions.

Some Lurchers and Greyhounds may be new to living in a home, so might need some time to adjust to household noises and basic training. Positive reinforcement and patience will help them settle in (we can help with this), and soon they'll be keeping all four paws on the ground like pros.

# 20 years of Freedom

**This year, we're celebrating Freedom's 20th anniversary.**

Over the past 20 years, we've supported over 2,500 owners to find freedom from domestic abuse by offering a temporary foster home for their dogs while they get to safety. Without our incredible foster carers, we wouldn't be able to offer this life-saving service.

We recently caught up with Catherine, who's fostered four dogs for Freedom so far, and isn't showing any signs of stopping.

Catherine explains, "I first became aware of Freedom on social media. I had no idea of the impact of domestic abuse on dogs, and when I found out I knew that I wanted to help."

When Catherine and her husband Tommy got their first foster dog, it was love at first sight. "Our first foster dog was a beautiful Siberian husky who we instantly fell head over heels for."

Initially she seemed terrified of men and wouldn't go anywhere near Tommy. When taking her on walks we would do things like crossing the road if a man was walking towards us. By giving her the space she needed, slowly but surely, we were able to show her that she didn't need to be fearful. And she soon developed a great bond with Tommy. Helping her on her journey to a happier life was so heartwarming.

Saying goodbye to her was hard and we shed quite a few tears, but it also felt good knowing she was going back to her family who were now safe and settled."

When we asked Catherine about the benefits of fostering with us, she had this to say: "It gets you out of the house every day, no matter what the weather, and you get a lot of great exercise walking the dog. When out walking, more people talk to you, so it becomes quite a social thing. And it gives you a sense of purpose, knowing that you're helping a family by keeping their dog safe and loved."

But the most rewarding thing for Catherine? "Gaining a dog's trust after everything they've been through."

We give our foster dogs the best life we can. It only takes a few days for them to begin settling into a calming home environment. They are walked in woodland every day and we will do all we can to cater for their every need. Most importantly, we show them that they are loved. It melts our hearts when we see that they love us as much as we love them."

If Catherine, or any of our foster carers, need any help or advice with the dogs, our Freedom team are always on hand to help. Catherine says, "The team are so helpful. If I need a quick response, I just call or WhatsApp them and someone always responds. The behaviour support has been invaluable for tips on behaviour and training. Especially for the Collie we fostered who struggled with having a harness on. I followed the training guidance Jodie showed me, and after around 10 days, I was able to get a harness on him without too much fuss. It's such a weight off my mind knowing that the support is always there."



Catherine says, "If you're thinking about fostering for Freedom, absolutely go for it. You'd not only be helping the dogs, but also their families escape domestic abuse. The whole process is so rewarding, from getting a temporary furry friend to fill your life with joy, to helping them feel safe, settled, and able to be their true selves."

Dogs Trust provides everything you need for the dogs, including paying for any veterinary treatment. A 24-hour emergency service means you can call for advice any time of the day or night. And did I mention you get to hang out with dogs??"

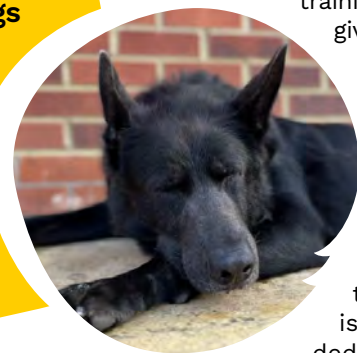


# How your love of dogs lives on through a gift in your will

In April 2023, Blue was among four German Shepherds that came to us in poor condition after having been neglected. They were brought to Evesham rehoming centre and were all anxious and unfamiliar with the outside world.

Blue was the most terrified, and really struggled with kennel life. Our expert vets put him on medication to help ease his anxiety and our dedicated training team worked hard to gain his trust. The training barn at our Evesham centre, funded by legacy giving, was a safe space for Blue to learn and instrumental in his rehabilitation. Slowly but steadily his confidence began to grow.



In February 2024, Blue was finally ready to find a forever home. He met a family and they immediately fell in love. Understanding his medical and behavioural needs, they worked closely with our team. After a successful home trial, Blue was officially adopted in April 2024 and is now thriving in his new home, a testament to the dedication and love he received in our care thanks to gifts in wills.

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# Demystifying muzzles



There are many reasons a dog might wear a muzzle. Sometimes they're a safety measure for dogs who've been known to show aggressive behaviour in some situations, or dogs who've learnt to chase and catch. But that's not the only reason. For a dog who eats everything they find, a muzzle could be a lifesaver if it stops them swallowing something harmful. If a dog is in pain or ill, a muzzle can ensure a vet can provide care more safely. And some dogs may not need a muzzle for any other reason than they are required to wear one by law.

Ultimately, muzzles help keep us, our dogs, and those around us, safe. So, if you see a dog with a muzzle on, you know their owner is being responsible and looking out for others.

## Do dogs mind wearing muzzles?

A muzzle could be scary or frustrating for your pooch if they aren't introduced to it in a gradual, positive way. But with reward-based training, dogs can learn to be confident wearing a muzzle in the same way they learn to wear a collar or harness. Once your dog is happy to wear their muzzle, they'll have just as much fun on walks and enjoy their time outdoors like any other dog.

But be aware that a muzzle won't make your dog feel safer or change the way they respond to situations or triggers. You'll still need to avoid things that worry them as much as you can, and seek help from a qualified trainer or behaviourist to help them overcome their worries.

There are lots of types of muzzles — choose one that fits comfortably and that your dog can eat, drink and pant through, like a basket type muzzle.

## How do you train a dog to wear a muzzle?

Training your dog to wear a muzzle takes time and patience. Before you ever put it on, you'll need to build a positive association with the muzzle and show your dog it's nothing scary. Then you'll need to help them gradually get comfortable with putting their nose inside the muzzle and build up to fastening the straps. Once your dog is relaxed and confident, you can leave the muzzle on for increasing periods of time, making sure it's always fun and positive for them.

# The human heroes helping our hounds

## For Pat and Dave, falling in love with our dogs has happened not once, but three times.

“We’d adopted from Dogs Trust before and wanted to help an older, overlooked dog,” say Pat and Dave.

The couple came across an older boy called Hector at their local centre in Kenilworth. “We thought we wanted a smaller dog, but we fell in love when meeting him,” says Pat.

Hector was scared of lots of things and hadn’t had the best life so far. “We learned all the ways to support Hector with the centre’s help. At first, he wouldn’t turn round on walks and now we know how to help him,” says Dave.

Later in the year, the couple thought Hector may like a friend after seeing him play with other pups during walkies. “We saw Gizmo on the website and knew the centre would take the time to work out if it was right.”

A stray from Ireland, Gizmo was a very nervous chap who’d been at the centre for over six months. He came into our care after struggling to cope with the loss of another dog in his home. He needed a new best friend to help him feel safe, and Pat and Dave thought that could be Hector.

Over a few weeks, they attended training sessions at the centre, learning more about what makes Gizmo happy, how to use his muzzle, and how he likes to meet people.

They adopted Gizmo on the last day of 2023 and he quickly became inseparable with Hector. “We set up a few beds in different rooms so they could have space, but they always wanted to be in the same room.”

Pat and Dave say our support has helped them give their pups the best life possible. “There’s a huge support network and you’re never alone.”

They add, “We’ve given them time and kindness as they figure things out. I think that’s the best thing we can give to dogs.”

## John Dawson

Our fosterers go above and beyond, giving dogs short-term loving homes while we find their perfect match. One fosterer making a difference at our Glasgow centre is John Dawson.

Since 2021, John’s fostered 20 dogs that were struggling in kennels or needing extra help. “I’ve fostered many breeds, from Pugs to Great Danes. My shortest foster was four hours, and my longest was seven months,” says John. “It means a lot to give dogs a great home for what could be the hardest part of their life and get them ready for a new chapter.”

One of John’s befriended pups is Jupiter, who’s been with us for three years. John and our centre staff gave Jupiter all the time and space he needed to feel safe with John. After a couple meets, he took Jupiter home on a weekend trip to give him a break from kennels and get to know him better.

By getting to know Jupiter in a home environment and passing that information on to our canine carers, John has helped us determine the home he needs.

Our Glasgow Home from Home team says, “We’re so happy to have John as a foster carer. So many dogs have benefitted from his love, care, and training.”

## Nick Munro

Nominee for Petplan’s 2024 ‘Volunteer of the Year’, Nick Munro is a shining example of the everyday heroes doing their all for the pups in our care.

After retiring in 2019, Nick saw his local rehoming centre’s hard work first-hand and wanted to help.

“When we adopted two dogs from Dogs Trust Shrewsbury, I was so impressed by what the team do to help dogs. When they passed away, I knew I wanted to help,” says Nick.

As a Volunteer Canine Assistant, Nick spends two mornings a week at the centre helping with long walks, playtime and kennel duties. “I love getting to walk dogs of all ages, sizes, and personalities. It’s so lovely to see them go to their forever home. I also love giving attention to dogs taking longer to find their perfect family,” says Nick.

Nick is so dedicated to his pooch pals that he even spent the morning of his 60th birthday at the centre.

# Running for Rover



**Annie Rawlinson, and her alter ego Brewski the dog, have taken part in many runs all over the UK to raise pounds for our hounds.**

Her first big run happened during the pandemic, when she did the virtual London Marathon as laps of her garden dressed as Brewski. Brewski went on to run the London Marathon for real the following year, and then the London Landmarks Half Marathon, as well as all kinds of other runs in between. But Annie's biggest challenge to date was yet to come.

As she turned 60, Annie decided to put down the Brewski costume to take on the Rat Race Run Britannia. This challenge saw Annie run an astonishing 1,030 miles from Land's End to John O'Groats over five weeks. 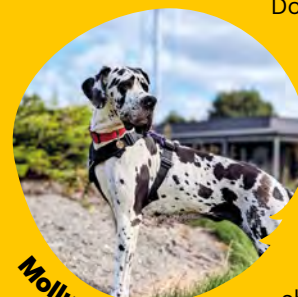

# Spiced apple celebration cupcakes

This next one goes out to the party puppers. Whether it's a birthday, gotcha day, or simply some good behaviour at the vets. Spice up your celebrations with these canine-friendly apple cupcakes.

## You'll need

- ½ an apple, grated or chopped finely
- Pinch of cinnamon
- 100g self-raising flour
- 100g oats
- 1 ripe banana, mashed
- 120ml oat or soya milk (unsweetened)

## For the topping

- 2 potatoes, mashed
- Peanut butter (xylitol free)
- Small dog biscuit

## What to do

1. Preheat your oven to 200°C.
2. Mash or blend the banana and milk together.
3. Combine the flour, oats, apple and cinnamon with the banana mixture.
4. Spoon evenly into your muffin tray and bake for 10-15 minutes.
5. Meanwhile, mix the mashed potato and peanut butter for the topping.
6. Once golden, take your cakes out of the oven and let cool.
7. Top each cake with some mashed potato using a spoon or piping bag.
8. Add a biscuit to each cake, and – voila! – you're ready for your pooch party.



**Top tip:** use an appropriately sized biscuit for your individual pup. You may need to chop your cake up before feeding to them.



When making these treats, reduce your dog's usual food portion so that they're not overfed. If you're concerned about giving your dog new foods, speak to your vet before baking.



## Ready for adventure?

Do you love going on adventures with your four-legged friend?

Exploring new places can benefit you and your dog, with different sights and sounds for you both, and new smells to stimulate your dog's senses. It doesn't have to be a mountain hike, a pootle through the woods can be just as joyful. Whatever you like doing, quality time with your pooch is what dog ownership is all about.

For the dogs in our care, an enriching escapade can be even more important. That's why our staff, like trainer Ross from our Kenilworth centre, regularly take dogs like Dexter for off-site adventures.

Over the past three years, we've worked with MINI to inspire the nation's dog owners to explore more places with their own Adventure Dogs. And earlier this year, they gave us a new MINI Countryman so that Labrador cross Dexter could travel in comfort and style to his exciting woodland walks.

Underdog Dexter has been at our Kenilworth centre for around two years, so fun outings like this give him a break from kennel life, with lots of new sights and smells to enjoy, and a new place to practise his training.

## for reactive dogs



Is your pooch fearful of other dogs? Do they bark at other dogs when on a lead? Or do you struggle to get them to focus on you around other four-legged friends?

Our reactive Dog School can help you and your dog overcome these challenges, together.

### What's included?

Across six sessions, you'll get:

- a 1-2-1 class giving you and your dog an opportunity to learn basic skills and prepare for group sessions, with personalised help from one of our skilled coaches
- an introductory group session including a Q&A, course outline, and the chance to meet other dog owners facing similar issues
- four more weekly group classes, with up to three other doggie classmates.

### What will you learn?

Slowly and safely, we'll help your dog feel calmer and more relaxed around other dogs and teach you emergency techniques to use in challenging situations.

In class, you'll learn:

- why your dog reacts the way they do
- techniques to reduce their reactivity around other dogs
- how to teach your dog to walk calmly and keep focus while on the lead
- most importantly, how to make walks enjoyable for you and your pal.

### Our standalone 1-2-1 class

If you think a 1-2-1 session might suit you and your pup better, you can now sign up to a standalone 1-2-1 reactive Dog School class.

#### Are 1-2-1 classes for you?

Our booking team will help you decide whether 1-2-1 classes are the right choice for you and your pup. Classes cover the basics needed to help your dog overcome the daily challenges they face. Just you, your dog, and one of our skilled coaches.

1-2-1 classes work well for dogs who aren't quite ready for a group environment. They'll suit you if you can't commit to a six-week course, or a venue that might not be convenient for you. Unlike group sessions, our 1-2-1 classes can take place at any of our venues.

# Our work around the world



As well as improving the lives of dogs in the UK, our mission takes us around the world to help dogs in need. We run and support projects on five continents, working with local organisations to address the dog welfare issues that most need our help.

We work with local partners on projects that tackle the most serious issues in their countries and communities, including vaccination, neutering, veterinary training, education in schools and community outreach.

We're currently supporting projects in Thailand, India, Sri Lanka, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Serbia, USA, Canada, Zimbabwe, Malawi, South Africa, Ecuador, Guatemala and more. By sharing our knowledge, we're helping to make big, sustainable changes to dog welfare.

### Mission Rabies

A key focus of our work is rabies prevention. Rabies isn't present in the UK, but in other countries it still kills thousands of people and millions of dogs every year. Dog bites are the main way people catch rabies, and once they do, there's no cure. So, vaccinating dogs is the most effective way to stop the disease. In 2023, we merged with Worldwide Veterinary Service (WVS) and Mission Rabies, so we can make even more difference in the fight against the disease.

### Bosnia and Herzegovina

We've been working in Bosnia for 10 years, running neutering campaigns, veterinary training, Dog Schools and more. We've helped local authorities implement animal welfare law and solve the roaming dog problem. Our work there has created a model for animal welfare programmes in eastern Europe that could improve the lives of millions of dogs.

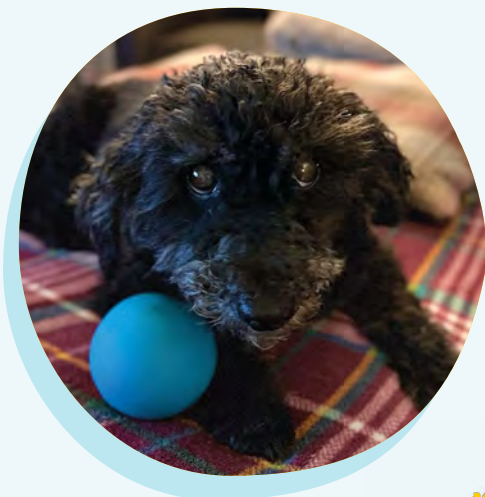
### Thailand

In Greater Bangkok, we work with Soi Dog Foundation to run Catch Neuter Vaccinate Return (CNVR) programmes, through which dogs are safely caught, neutered and vaccinated, and then returned to their communities. Since 2016, we've helped neuter and vaccinate over 330,000 dogs in the area, which has been really successful for reducing the roaming dog population and tackling disease.

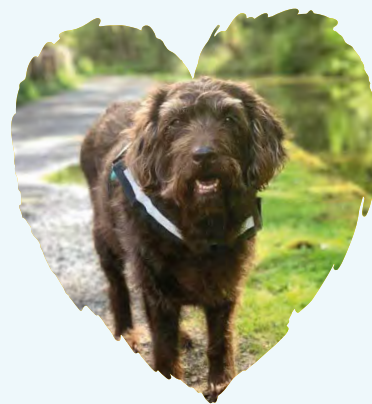
## Echo of Leeds

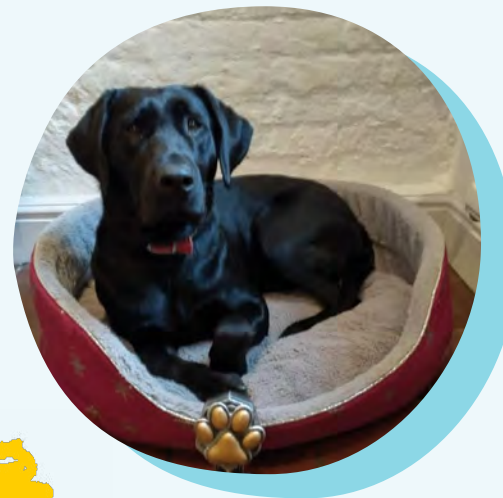


## In memory of Dexter

# You're the hero dogs like Molly desperately need.

Molly was found dodging cars on a busy road, terrified and all alone without a safe place to go. With no one to look after her, she must have felt so lost.

Thankfully, a kind passerby managed to rescue Molly and contacted the local dog warden. But under the dog warden's care in Northern Ireland, Molly's future was uncertain. Legally in Northern Ireland, dogs are only held for five days — if no one claimed Molly by then, she was at risk of being put to sleep. It was a race against time. Would someone come to rescue Molly?

Thanks to you, we were able to collect Molly from the pound and get her to safety. Because of your generosity and support, our transfer drivers can rescue dogs from pounds and bring them to our rehoming centres where they can start a new life.
